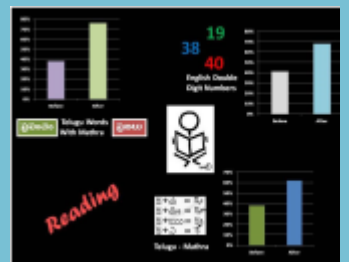

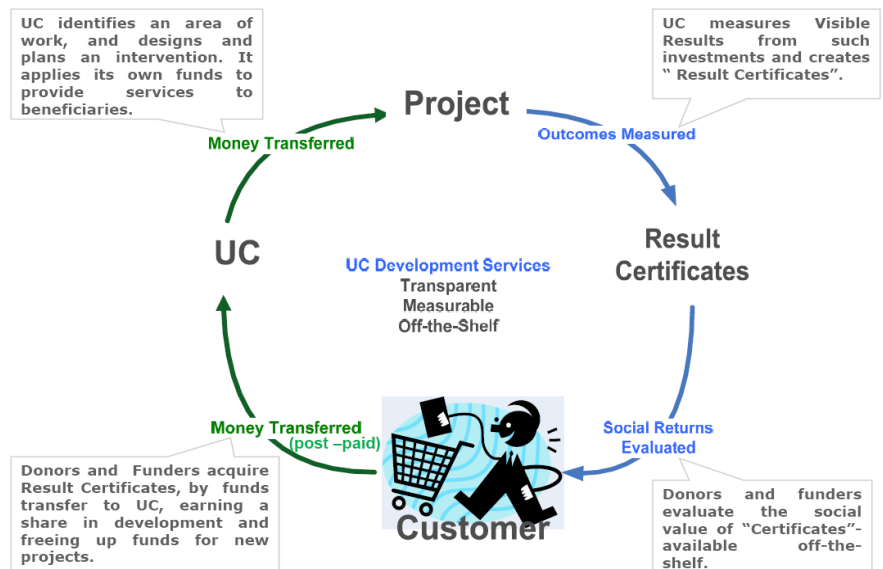

It can be noted from the above table that, Move the Wheel Foundation currently supports this schools by providing additional resources that impacts Teacher to students ratio positively. MTWF also provides support by enhancing infrastructure. MTWF team is currently working on challenges related to increasing the number of class rooms and providing safe drinking water for the students and the staff of the school. MTWF team facilitated constant support of stationery items to the children. MTWF is also working on improving the response of the two basic challenges that face the school i.e., Student Regularity & Parental Involvement.

Below schematic provides information about the key focus areas MTWF team is trying to address in this school. MTWF aligns their activity plans in accordance with scope of key focus areas.

Areas of Focus



Support provided by UC

UC has started supporting in MTWF team in various activities over last 7 months. UC started its engagement with Move The Wheel Foundation since July 2011 onwards. UC and MTWF teams signed of MoU document in month of December, 2011. UC aims to support MTWF in enhancing the learning experience for children in this government school.

Baseline Assessment of Children on Essential Skills

In the month of July, 2011, UC team introduced baseline assessment process to assess students' skill levels in some essential Reading, Writing and Math Skills. UC team also mobilized volunteers for conducting these assessments along with MTWF team. Based on the outcomes of the baseline assessment MTWF team provided inputs to the teaching team at Gowlidoddi school to bring students up to the mark with regards to basic skills. After five and half months, re-assessments were conducted by several volunteers on 21st of Jan, 2012. The impact of focussed intervention was visible from the outcomes of the re-assessments conducted. Below table provides information about various Read, Write and Math skills against which baseline assessment and re-assessment was conducted and one can note the significant increase in the skill acquisition amongst class 3 students after the intervention was completed.

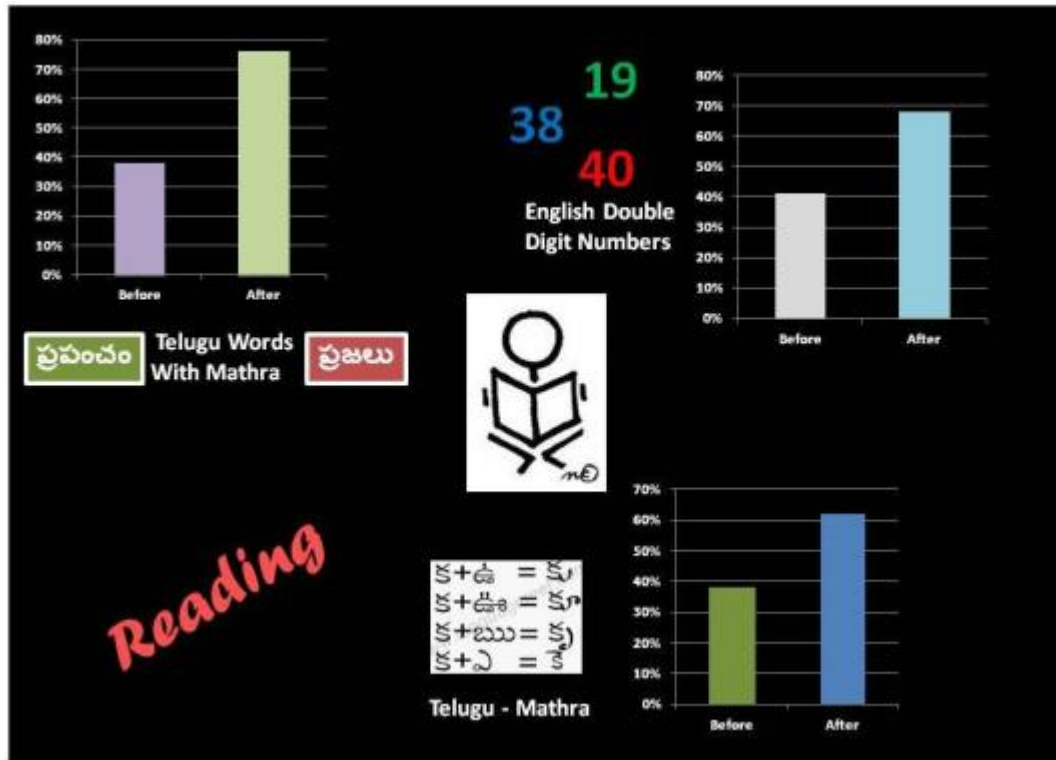

Observations pertaining to Class 3 analysis

1. Baseline was taken up by 50 students, out of which only **34** underwent re-assessment. So the analysis was done on data related to 34 students. If we complete re-assessment of those who were absent, we might get better picture.

2. Out of total 25 skills in Reading, Writing and math **13** skills have shown increase more than **20 %** . This is a very encouraging trend.
3. Some skills like Writing Telugu words with & Without mathra have shown increase more than **40 %**
4. One of the universal problem is Math Division, even that has shown **29%** increase.

Below image highlights some of the Reading skills, where students have shown significant increase in the skill acquisition after the intervention was facilitated by MWTF team.



Volunteer Participation

Volunteers play key role in conducting assessments and re-assessments of the students. During re-assessment process, UC team facilitated participation of over 10 volunteers. This participation constituted over 30 hours of volunteering hours.

Creating Awareness about Eco-friendly Waste management practices

It was observed that a significant amount of food waste was generated from school premises. This was resultant of Mid-day meals program run in the school, where in students are provided with nutritional supplements. Lot of organic waste was generated from school kitchen on a daily basis and significant amount of food was also wasted. Littered kitchen and food waste resulted in unhygienic environment in the school premises. UC team suggested to implement composting process which will then turn the organic waste into compost. In the month of December with the help of MTWF team and students , UC team had set up composting facility called C-garden. This was not only meant to serve the waste management practices but also is meant to act as ongoing environmental sciences project for school students. Along with Aaya,

students from class 5 and 6 now participate on daily basis to stir the waste and maintain the facility. In the second week of January, 2012, this initiative was published in the regional edition of Telugu News daily called “Saakshi”. Outcomes pertaining to this project are documented and will be presented as separate UC result certificate.

Students along with school administration are now diligently segregating dry waste generated. This dry waste, primarily comprising of paper waste, is being now donated to UC lead initiative called “Do Not waste, Donate your waste”.

Infrastructure Support for enabling learning through multi media

UC team is facilitating learning of these students through multi media. In the month of December, 2011, UC team deployed projector to MTWF team. Projector can be leveraged in teaching children, various concepts which have high quality online content. Projector enables better participation from all the students, as visual medium can enhance both teaching and learning experiences.

MTWF team is working on structuring the multi media driven intervention and they will shortly provide exhaustive details of this plan. Currently high level information has been provided by MTWF team with regards to utilization of this projector.

MTWF team’s plans on leveraging the projector is quoted below.

“In the future, efforts are on to scan and project Govt provided Flash Cards for learning sessions. Some of these flash cards are lesson based, some are math exercises, some are moral stories and some help improve reading & comprehension. Flash Card sessions can be made more effective if they are projected on a screen rather than the teacher holding them and struggling to engage the class.

The presence of the projector has inspired us to plan for a more important and effective use of the projector for the future academic years with Active learning Sessions.

We plan to train staff in Active Learning Method, where the teacher plays the role of enabler, encouraging group discussion and showing the children how to figure out answers. In these sessions, the question and answers can be projected to promote class wide learning experience.

Lesson wise multimedia and internet based content can also be shown for the childrens' benefit. This approach will get the whole class involved and actively participate in a fun filled way to teach lessons. This, we believe will improve their retention of the subject matter and get them interested to be life long learners.”

UC team also provided hand held scanner to MTWF team. This device is meant to be used for scanning the relevant content to be projected on periodic basis. MTWF will also use this device for other administrative purposes.

Visits by UC Representative

UC team have been constantly engaging with MTWF team since July 2011 and had made several visits to the school since then. During these visits UC team also has participated in several activities like facilitating baseline assessments and participating in discussions with School administration team. This interface has helped UC understand the MTWF's work at this school. These visits also helped UC to identify potential areas of engagement. UC team was also glad to see the efforts put in by School administration on resources supported by MTWF team to maintain the composting facility. With regards to utilization of projector for learning purpose, UC team will closely work with MTWF team in enabling the multimedia driven learning sessions.

Conclusion

In the next one quarter, UC team aims at mobilizing volunteering , financial and other infrastructural resources as per the requirement of the school to enhance the over all learning experience of the children. UC team will also closely work with MTWF team to capture the impact of deploying Multimedia enabled learning process. UC team will also aim at in increasing collaborative efforts to support the Government School. UC team already facilitated dialogue between MTWF team and Adhya Educational Society, which currently aims at providing outreach training programs to government schools and other low cost private schools.
